PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE | Brent Schnell

Thank you to all our current members for your continued support of the Long Lake Association (LLA)!

We will continue to strive to accomplish our main mission “to preserve Long Lake as a natural resource and recreation area through protection and prudent use of its environs.” For example, we have had great success in controlling the levels of Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) thanks to your support. We will continue to address this aquatic invasive species and our vision is to become a resource to provide education to the LLA members regarding other aquatic and terrestrial invasive species. For example, we will provide info on invasive species currently impacting the trees in our watershed including oak wilt and Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA). We also have discovered a new aquatic invasive species in Long Lake in 2020: zebra mussels. We have created a new committee to specifically respond to the zebra mussel threat. In addition, our sister organization, Long Lake Foundation, has created the “LLF Invasive Species Defense Fund” to help fund the study and remediation of both aquatic and terrestrial invasive species in and around Long, Mickey and Ruth Lakes.

Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 restrictions, the board felt it was necessary to cancel the Welcome Back to Paradise Party at Boone's Long Lake Inn for 2021. We are evaluating adding a social element to our August meeting if conditions allow. Please take time to read through this newsletter to get updates from the Committee Chairs.

I would like to encourage those that are not LLA members to join for the annual membership fee of \$35.00 to help us in our mission to protect our lakes. We plan to reinstate our NMC intern program after a hiatus in 2020 due to COVID-19. I would sincerely like to thank our partners: Oleson Foundation, Long Lake Township, Long Lake Foundation, and NMC for their ongoing support!

We will be celebrating our 100th anniversary this year with our roots dating back to 1921! Please review the info in the newsletter and future updates on our website as we celebrate this milestone.

LLA COMMITTEE NEWS

LAKE MANAGEMENT | Brent Schnell / Dave Baker

The Lake Management-Treatment Committee and our key lake management partners met on April 12, 2021. The purpose of the meeting was to analyze the drone mapping pictures following the 2020 applications, evaluate the success of the two treatments and plan for the 2021 season. Zero Gravity (the drone company) presented us with data to help plan for 2021. Clear Water Lake Management (our product applicator) was also at the meeting to help us interpret the information and do planning for 2021. In 2020, approximately 12 acres were treated. This represents only 0.4% of the total surface area of Long, Ruth and Mickey lakes combined.

Our plan is to continue to treat the aquatic invasive species Eurasian Watermilfoil twice each year to improve the quality of the lakes for boating, etc. using advanced technology to precisely target the treatment to where it is needed. The 2021 plan is to treat approximately the same total area as in 2020 (e.g. 12 acres), There are some areas that were treated in 2020 that will not require treatment this year. Many of the areas that contained the aquatic invasive species Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) are growing native plants now that the Eurasian Watermilfoil is gone. There are some areas that were treated successfully in past years, but now the Eurasian Watermilfoil has returned that will require treatment in 2021. These are among the areas that will be treated on **Tuesday June 22, 2021 and Tuesday July 20, 2021**. The rain date will be the next day, if necessary.

The activities of the Lake Management Committee on all three lakes are totally funded by the Long Lake Association and our local partners. Your membership dues are an important part of our funding to control the levels of Eurasian Watermilfoil to protect our lake from this very aggressive aquatic invasive species. If you wish to provide further financial support of this program, the Long Lake Foundation has created the "LLF Invasive Species Defense Fund" to further study and remediate both aquatic and terrestrial invasive species in and around Long, Mickey and Ruth Lakes. ISLAND MAINTENANCE | Adam Adamczak

Long Lake's five islands provide lake users with a unique opportunity for recreation. Picnics, hiking, and anchoring off the shores of the islands are encouraged. However, fires and camping on the islands are prohibited. Removal of trash is a must and any trash that can be taken off is appreciated. Clean islands are a must for everyone to enjoy. Remember to avoid steep banks along shorelines to help prevent erosion. Poison ivy and the occasional fallen tree can be found along island trails, so hike cautiously. I look forward to seeing everyone's smiling faces at the islands this summer. Enjoy!

WATER QUALITY 2020-2021 | Len Klein / Barry Lishawa

We are planning a full season of testing this year! Two promising interns have been selected, Kelsey Mills and Meagan Walters. Both are Northwestern Michigan College Water Studies students. They will be mentored by Len Klein, Phyllis Laine, Barry Lishawa, and Dick Roeper. Abbey Hull, a 2019 intern will work with them on data analysis and writing this year's report.

Last year we did very little sampling due to the pandemic. As a result of the protocols of NMC and our testing labs, we did not have interns. Also, there was no MiCorps' Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program as it was not funded by the State. To improve our future testing, we acquired a YSI monitoring instrument.

The recommendations of the 2019 study are still valid. Everyone is encouraged to limit or eliminate chemical fertilizer applications near the lake and to ensure that septic systems are functioning properly. Efforts should continue to be made to control surface water runoff and to minimize erosion by creating a natural vegetation buffer zone or "green belt" along the shoreline. These approaches will help limit the introduction of additional phosphorus and nitrates into the lakes' ecosystem. Leaves and other debris should not be raked into the lakes. These measures will help preserve oligotrophic status of Mickey and Long Lakes. Hopefully Ruth Lake, which is an eutrophic lake, will remain relatively stable with these efforts.

We would also like to note that Sierra Clark, one of our interns from 2018, is a current Mishigamiing Journalism Project Fellow. She is Michigan's only full-time Indigenous affairs journalist and will be joining the Record-Eagle newsroom in June.

WATER SAFETY & ROAD CLEAN UP | Mark Cerny

Water Safety: The LLA and the water safety committee continues to work closely with the Grand Traverse Sheriff on monitoring boating activity on Long Lake. A closer eye will be put on jet ski violations as well as making sure wake boats are using the middle of the lake rather than the shorelines. Waterfront owners have complained that wake boats cruising close to the shoreline have endangered docks, moored boats, and shoreline vegetation with the larger than normal waves that are generated. On another note, the fireboat pontoon operated by the Long Lake Fire Dept. has been relocated to Gilbert Park. The new location will be much closer to the fire station and the response time to any calls will be greatly reduced. If you didn't know, the fireboat is mainly used for fire incidents on our islands. If you see suspicious smoke or fires on any of the islands, please call emergency response at 911.

We will contract for additional marine patrol on an as needed basis

INVASIVE SPECIES [ZEBRA MUSSELS] | Rick Dahlstrom

Zebra and quagga mussels in Long Lake?

Zebra mussels are a well-known invasive species in the Great Lakes region. Together with their cousin the quagga mussel (which can grow a little larger and live in deeper waters, but looks the same), they have spread into inland waters and the Great Lakes since they arrived in Lake St. Clair more than 20 years ago. They cause a variety of negative changes in the lakes where they live: they filter out tiny food particles that young fish like walleye and perch need to survive and grow, are responsible for loon and other waterfowl deaths through botulism poisoning and are a nuisance to swimmers and boaters with their sharp edges and ability to form massive colonies on any dock, hoist or structure in the water.



Many northern Michigan lakes have seen zebra and quagga mussels appear and flourish. Long Lake has been extremely fortunate to avoid such infestations, in part due to it being a relatively quiet lake with few boat launches (most invasive species are unknowingly brought in by boaters that don't live on the lake). However, several lake residents have recently found small clumps of mussels. Zebra mussels can have small populations for years before suddenly showing explosive growth. They are usually about ¼-1.5 inches long, with brown and tan stripes (though stripes may be lacking) on a D-shaped shell. They produce microscopic eggs that can travel through open water and in bilge water or minnow buckets on boats.

Because Long Lake may be in the early stages of an invasion, it is important to document and remove all new populations to slow their spread. If you think you may have found a zebra or quagga mussel, please note the exact location, take a photo, and remove the mussels from the water, making sure no parts of the mussel are left in the lake. Removal will not only prevent them from releasing more eggs but will allow Long Lake Association to make a positive identification. In September of 1921, twenty-five Long Lake property owners at the south end of the lake banded together and pitched in \$1 each to form an organization named the Evergreen Beach Resort Association. This pioneering group of lake lovers recognized the need to organize to effectively maintain the quality of Long Lake for themselves and generations to come. The name was formally changed to The Long Lake Improvement Association in 1948. Later, the word Improvement was dropped, and the organization was incorporated as it stands today. Our Loons

2020 was another strong year for the loon population on Long Lake. Between the resident loons and migrating groups, there were often 15-25 birds on the lake every day.

Five of the six nesting sites were active last spring resulting in 9 eggs laid and 3 juvenile loons leaving the lake in the fall. With an early spring this year, we are looking forward to a very successful nesting season in 2021.

Please remember to stay outside of the buoy markers or at least 200ft from the nesting sites.



Fishing

The results from the DNR fish survey, that was completed in 2017, are expected to be published this spring. The completed document will be added to the LLA website when it is available.

Long Lake continues to boast some of the best walleye fishing in northern Michigan with many limit catches reported in the spring, summer, and fall. Anglers also do very well fishing for bass, perch, and bluegill on the lake.
